

Kelly Weaver, SDSA President



While I have been busy with many activities and interactions in my short couple of months as President, I am afraid I have failed in the snow delivery department. I applaud the clubs who organized events with the early snows and are finding activities that can held snow or no snow. Even social events are a great way to keep club members involved during the season. Unfortunately, the lack of snow did result in the cancellation of the Governor's Ride for the 2nd time in 3 years. We will be looking at other ways to engage with our legislators this session.

I am excited to visit as many clubs as possible during my term as President. I attended 3 club meetings in January with more on the schedule through the spring. One of the things I am sharing with clubs is an overview of the funding which supports our snow-mobile trail system. It has been an eye-opening discussion to hear their questions and provide some insight on the program. Since FY 2011, the Trails Fund Balance has seen a negative trend and is at its lowest balance in over two decades. In recent years, annual expenses average around \$924,000 and revenues just over \$864,000. We all need to be educated on this topic as we move forward to make the changes necessary to sustain

the Snowmobile Trail Program. Why is this important, you ask?

First, a brief overview of the Snowmobile Trails Fund that supports our Black Hills Trail System and the Grant In Aid program for the East River trails that your clubs manage. What do I mean when I say "support"? The Snowmobile Trail Fund pays for all the groomers, drags and trail marking sign materials along with related operating expenses (fuel, maintenance, insurance, facilities, etc). It pays for the Grants given to snowmobile clubs for maintaining trails East River. It pays for all the State staff that work on the snowmobile trails – groomers, mechanics and administrators who negotiate the trail routes with other stakeholders and manage the program. All things snowmobiling - you get the picture.

There are 3 primary funding sources for the Snowmobile Trails Fund, listed here in order of revenue generated: 3% excise tax on new and used sleds, gas tax on 125 gallons of gas for each registered snowmobile, and snowmobile registration fees. We have also successfully accessed federal Recreational Trail Program (RTP) grants over the years to assist in purchasing grooming equipment.

The key point is that these funding sources are paid by snowmobilers for snowmobiling. It is time to take a serious look at fee changes to sustain South Dakota snowmobiling as we know it. This may come in the form of increases to existing fees or possibly instituting an out of state user permit. There is still some data to be collected before any specific recommendations are made, and any changes made will need to go through the legislative process. We as snowmobilers will need to step forward and ask the legislature to allow us to raise fees on ourselves. We are not asking for money from the State; we are asking for money from ourselves.

Elsewhere in this issue you will find articles from Ryan Raynor and Kim Raap with additional detail and insight. Please take the time to soak in this information and ask all the questions you have. This will help us as we prepare to educate our legislators and make our case. Keep an eye on future Sno-Plainsman issues for updates as recommendations are being developed. And when the President comes to visit your club, see if you can stump her! See you on the trails (next year?)

- The \$10 registration fee has not been raised since it was instituted in 1971!
- For each registered sled, roughly \$35 in gas taxes are deposited into the fund. That's a pretty good return on a \$10 investment.
- Of the twelve surrounding states in the snowbelt, South Dakota is only one of two states in the region with no out of state user fee. (The other is Nebraska which does not have a statewide trail system.)
- The Governor's Snowmobile Advisory Council consist of 7 member who provide oversight and guidance of the Snowmobile Trails Fund administered by the SD Game Fish and Parks.






To the right: Here's where we stand with the Jon LaFramboise Scholarship for the YETIS.

As I look outside today, all of our snow is gone. The Governor's Ride has been canceled, and the forecast looks more like balmy spring than wintery-white February. As we are lamenting about not being able to snowmobile, the economic impact of not having snow is something that I never seriously considered before.

USD did an economic impact study in 2011 about the economic impact of snowmobiling in South Dakota. While these figures are definitely dated, it still gives us an idea of how important snowmobiling is to the state of South Dakota. Roughly 1400 jobs are supported by snowmobiling. \$15 million comes in from trip-related spending for hotels, cabins, casinos, and eating establishments. Snowmobile retailers and distributors bring in \$58 million and with the rise in the cost of snowmobiles, this number is most likely higher now. The total economic impact is \$131.6 million. This is a good reminder of why we support Back the Ride and the Right to Ride. The cooperatives that we have with landowners and the forestry division are fostered with care to ensure that we have trails to ride on, and in turn, bring money into the state. As a whole, snowmobiling generates over \$26 billion in annual spending across the United States. We may fall short this year, but I'm hoping that March will bring us a few more blasts of snow to enjoy!

Reflections from the 2023 Hall of Fame Inductee

I would like to express my sincere thanks and gratitude to the Siouxland Sno-Trackers for their nomination and to SDSA for inducting me into the South Dakota Snowmobile Hall of Fame. This was truly a humbling surprise and an honor I will always treasure.

I'm a life-long snowmobiler, lucky to grow up in a snowmobiling family in Groton in the early 1970's, and have been extremely fortunate to work professionally for the past 45 years developing and managing snowmobile trail programs. My early years were spent working for SD GFP as a park manager and as the state trails coordinator, followed by being Wyoming's trails program manager.

For the past 20 years I've operated Trails Work Consulting, helping the American Council of Snowmobile Associations, as well as snowmobile associations and government agencies across the U.S. and Canada do long-range-planning, promote safe and responsible snowmobiling and to, most importantly, help keep motorized trails and riding access open and properly funded. My work has taken me to 20 states and 9 Canadian provinces and allowed me to actually snowmobile in 12 different states and 5 provinces. What an adventure it has been! But as I reflect on all my experiences over the years, my favorite place (still) to snowmobile with friends and family is in the Black Hills, the crown-jewel of South Dakota snowmobiling when we have good snow. It is such a beautiful place, with great trails as well as a wide range of family-friendly off-trail riding opportunities that is simply hard to beat.

I was recently compiling information for Wyoming about snowmobile fees in other states within their immediate region, as well as the states from where their snowmobile visitors. Having done several user studies for Wyoming, I know it's a well-established fact that half of all snowmobilers are nonresidents and that a full two-thirds of their out-of-state snowmobile visitors are typically from the Midwest. And having worked in both states, my observation is that is probably also true in respect to nonresident snowmobile visitors to the Black Hills — they also come from the south, east and north of South Dakota and likely represent up to a half of total snowmobile use in the Black Hills.

The table below shows the current annual registration/trail permit cost in surrounding states. The states shown with an average (avg.) cost are state's that have the combination of a multi-year registration fee plus an additional annual trail pass fee. Note that Nebraska and South Dakota were not included in the bottom average since (a) while Nebraska has a 2-year registration fee, it doesn't really have a statewide snowmobile trail system and (b) the purpose is to show the true regional average cost to snowmobile in surrounding states, outside of South Dakota.

What comes to mind in respect to South Dakota is that (1) South Dakota is far below the average cost to snowmobile and (2) South Dakota is the only state in the region (outside of Nebraska which doesn't have a statewide trail system) that doesn't charge a nonresident snowmobile fee.

The current \$10 annual resident snowmobile fee (of which \$2 goes to the Motor Vehicle Fund, so only \$8 is deposited into the Snowmobile Trails Fund) was established by the state legislature in 1971 – 53 years ago – and has never been increased.

It should be noted that \$1.00 in 1971 had the same purchasing power as it would have taken \$7.43 to purchase in 2023. The cost of grooming equipment, fuel, repairs, labor, etc., etc. have all gone up tremendously since 1971. Today we have far more challenges to continued access in

many of our favorite, most popular snowmobiling areas. The snowmobile fee was established in 1971 because SDSA and its clubs went to the legislature and asked them to "please let us charge ourselves a user fee so that we can fund our own trails and riding areas." All funding for Snowmobile Trails Fund comes from revenue initiated and pursued by SDSA, not from revenue proposed and pursued by Game, Fish and Parks or any other entity. It is something that snowmobilers' clearly own.

Perhaps it's time — perhaps far past time — for SDSA, its clubs and snowmobilers in general to start having conversations about the need for a fee increase, as well as to perhaps also consider getting into the business of asking our visitors to start paying a fee. SDSA and its members need to continue working to ensure that the snowmobile program remains adequately funded into the future. If anything is going to change, it's going to have to come from SDSA and its members taking the initiative and talking to their local legislators. The future of snowmobiling trails and continued access is very likely going to require additional funding. Which trail into the future are you going to choose to support — forward, backwards or gone?

Unfortunately snow conditions haven't quite been what we always hope for and while a few spots in the state received some good snow over a 2-to-3-week period, that quickly disappeared due to lack of new snow and above average temperatures.

We felt it an appropriate time to coordinate with a few other articles and provide an overview of program funding and a little bit of history mixed in. Thanks to Kim Raap, I'll share some charts that really paint a clear picture of how your snowmobile funds have seen some great highs but also some lows that are worth paying attention too.

As you know, South Dakota's Snowmobile Program is paid for completely from dedicated snowmobile funds. These funds come out of the pockets of snowmobilers and snowmobilers only. A \$10 resident license, 3% excise tax when purchasing a new or used snowmobile and finally a gas tax formula which usually amounts to about half of the generated revenue from year to year. (See Kim Raap's article to learn more about our resident fee and other states resident and non-resident fee structures.) The formula for the Gas Tax includes the number of resident registered sleds as of July 1st x Gas Tax which is currently .28 cents x 125 gallons of fuel. These 3 major sources of funding were all created through the SD Legislature with the resident license and Gas Tax implemented in the early 70's and the excise tax created in 1990. While other revenue streams come through the program such as the trail directory fee on the map, surplus of snowmobile related equipment, donations, and a few others, these all add up to pennies when comparing to the 3 major sources of funding. The last source of funding I'll mention is the 5-Day \$40 Temporary Permit. This permit was also

created through Legislation and last changed in 2007 where the permit went from \$10 to \$40. It was increased to \$40 because it was a way to collect funding that would otherwise be lost when a resident, doesn't license their snowmobile. \$27.50 is created through the gas tax and \$10 through the registration when a resident licenses their sled or \$37.50 between the two. Of course, a non-resident who comes to SD who doesn't have their sled legally registered in their home state would purchase the \$40 5 Day Temporary Permit as well and


the Gas tax formula doesn't include non-residents.


All revenue generated from what was discussed above goes into the Snowmobile Trails Fund. Below are a few graphs which show the history of that fund balance. As you'll see, our current fund balance is as low as it's been since the late 90's and early 2000's. While these figures along with others are shared consistently with the Snowmobile Advisory Council, if you don't attend these meetings, you may not be as aware of the history or current state. I hope this article, along with others shared in the February issue has



provided some valuable insight to those who weren't aware of the programs funding sources or a nice refresher for those who aren't as involved in SDSA or clubs as they used to be.

For my next article, I'll discuss more about expenses vs revenue specifically and how GFP manages your snowmobile funds through a dedicated snowmobile budget.

Being a member of one of South Dakota's many snowmobiling clubs is more like being a member of a big, adrenaline-loving family.

Being a part of a snowmobile club provides the opportunity to meet likeminded individuals that can easily turn into some of your best friends. That's the case for Mike Boock, of Rapid City, who is a longtime member of the Black Hills Snowmobile Club (BHSC).

"Most of the friendships that I have today are because of the snowmobile club. Many of us even camp together during the summer at the lake," Boock said.

Boock said the club boasts up to 70 members in all. While he primarily rides the mountains of Colorado and Wyoming, Boock loves riding in Black Hills when the area receives enough snow. There are a total of 416 miles of groomed snowmobile trails in the Black Hills National Forest, making is a pristine spot for snowmobiling.

The snowmobile clubs in the Black Hills have it a little easier than those out east as they don't have to mark, install, groom or repair trails.

"The state takes care of that," Boock said. "This allows clubs like the BHSC to become more of an educational and community support organization."

This allows club members more free time to volunteer or participate in community events, such as the Festival of Lights Parade and Storybook Island Christmas Nights of Light.

Kelly Weaver is the President of the South Dakota Snowmobile Association and a member

of the Aberdeen Drift Busters Snowmobile Club. The Aberdeen Drift Busters maintain what's called the Dakota Midland trail system, which connects Aberdeen, Mina Lake, Richmond Lake, Westport, Frederick and Columbia. "This provides about 75 miles of riding in a safe, marked, and groomed corridor," Weaver said.

There are rules governing the trail system.

While there are no posted speed limits on the trail, when the trail is located in a road right-of-way, the speed limit of the road applies. There are also laws governing the type of vehicle that can be ridden on a snowmobile trail. Machines must meet the state definition of a snowmobile. ATV's and other motorized vehicles do not typically meet that definition. Aberdeen Drift Busters has held the title of being the largest snowmobile club in the state for several years. It was established in 1969, the same year the South Dakota Snowmobile Association was established.

"Currently, our membership is right around 100 families," Weaver said. "The club has been as large as 225 members but membership has slowed over the past decade due to the lack of snow and the growing number of activities that families have an opportunity to participate in."

Anyone can join a snowmobile club and snowmobile ownership is not a requirement. "You are connected with very experienced snowmobilers who can provide information about machines, riding ventures and how organized snowmobiling operates," Weaver said. "It is a way to connect with people who have a shared passion for the sport."

Weaver had her first taste of snowmobiling as a young child with her father and neighbors.

"When I was young, I only rode as a passenger, which I found was not to my liking. When I met my future husband, he also had a snowmobile and I had to ride as a passenger once again," Weaver said.

Weaver and her husband decided to join the Aberdeen Drift Busters while taking a break from riding for a bite to eat years ago.

"In 1986, my fiancé – now husband – and I were on a snowmobile ride and stopped to eat at a trailside business. Another snowmobiler, who we did not know, approached us and told us we needed to join the club. We did and have been actively involved ever since. That snowmobiling 'stranger' became a lifelong friend who we've shared many snowmobile memories with," Weaver said. "Like most things we are drawn to, it is the ability to connect with others who share a common interest that keeps us involved. We have met so many people across the state and the nation through our involvement and have experienced some awesome and fun-filled trips over the years. There are so many ways to be involved that even members who are not avid riders can benefit from and enjoy being part of the club." Once married, Weaver decided she'd need her own sled if she were to continue with snowmobiling. When her husband acquired a new Po-

laris, she was granted a used Arctic Cat Jag that she described as a "trusty starter sled."

"Early on in our riding, we were able to make trips to the Black Hills, Big Horn Mountains and West Yellowstone. These venues are even more breathtaking in the winter," Weaver said.

A long day on the trail in a large riding area might last six to eight hours. There needs to be a minimum of six inches of snow on the ground, depending on the terrain

It may take several layers of snow to create a base for the trail, which can then be

groomed and maintained throughout the season. With adequate snow and a trail in place, an ideal riding day for Weaver would be sunny skies with a little wind, and temperatures between 0 and 30 degrees.


Over in the southeastern corner of the state, Duane Duerr, President of the Siouxland Sno Trackers, finds great enjoyment in riding his Ski Dooo 900 Ave Four Cycle snowmobile.

The Siouxland Sno Trackers is one of the original snowmobile clubs in South Dakota and has around 78 miles of groomed trails for its 80 members.

Duerr grew up in Minnesota and joined the club in 2006 when he moved to South Dakota. Joining the club helped him to learn the trails and rules, and provided him with many friendships. "I think snowmobiling has become more popular, but involvement in all organizations is down," Duerr said. "Many do not realize that snowmobile clubs are why we have a trail system and that they put it in and take it out. Without the clubs, we will no longer have trails in South Dakota. Member support is what makes a difference and too many take that involvement for granted."

Hello from the Northeast Corner of the State.


We haven't had enough snow to get the sleds out yet this year. We are still hopeful that we will get some snow so we can get out there.
