## Kelly Weaver, SDSA President



Welcome to a new snow season! Coming off back-to-back snow seasons that were on opposite ends of the spectrum, I am hoping for a Goldilocks winter, one that's 'just right! Check out the SDSA events calendar for some statewide and re-

gional events to put on your winter riding calendar.

This spring and summer I had the opportunity to attend American Council of Snowmobile Association (ACSA)'s DC Fly-in and the International Snowmobile Congress (ISC). These events give us an opportunity to connect with industry partners, federal agencies, our Congressional members and staff, and State Associations from across the snowbelt. For me, these events reinforce the importance of our organized snowmobile programs and the continual need to stay informed and get involved as needed.

During our meetings at ISC, Michigan shared that a snowmobile club was facing the closure of o.8 miles of county road that would close a trail that has provided access to a scenic and popular destination, Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore National Park, for decades. A county board meeting was set for the Monday following ISC, and the Michigan state association asked those present to send an email of support to the local club. I did, as did many others in the room. Following the meeting, it was reported that the County board was surprised that people beyond their local area and state sent comments. Some snowmobilers from Wisconsin even attended the meeting. They tabled action on the closure

to a future meeting. While I may never ride on this trail, our collective actions as a snowmobile community helped shine a light on local directives that affect our fellow riders and the business economy they support.

It is only through this collective support, that we can fight the good fight. When, not if, we face an issue in South Dakota, we too can tap our larger snowmobile community for support. With ACSA, we have a network of connections and resources to make this happen. Each Friday, the ACSA E-News shows up in my inbox and my facebook feed with an update on issues facing snowmobiling as well as activities in the snowbelt. Please consider joining ACSA (\$15 family; \$25 club). www.snowmobilers.org

While preparing my article, I received the sad news of the passing of Ken Stewart, a snowmobile pioneer in the world of organized snowmobiling. Ken served as SDSA's executive director for many years and had a wealth of snowmobiling knowledge. He was instrumental in establishing SDSA, charter clubs, and the Governor's Ride. When I first joined SDSA in 1985, Ken was long established in this role. He and other seasoned SDSA board members shared stories about the tireless efforts to establish our trail system and fee structure that funds it. Trips to Pierre to educate legislators and agency leaders and letter writing campaigns to state and federal legislators and regulators to support or oppose issues that affect our sport. For the past several decades, my generation has benefitted from this work with little effort on our part. If we are going to continue to enjoy this sport, we once again have to engage in the fight to sustain it. Are you ready?

Ryan Raynor reported at our August meeting that the Snowmobile Trails Fund balance increased this year with higher than expected revenues and lower costs due to the open winter. However, work continues on a review of our fee structure for the Snowmobile Trails Fund. A planning committee of GFP, Snowmobile Advisory Council, and SDSA members will be meeting over the fall. More information will be presented during the SDSA Convention. If you have input you would like the committee to consider, please let me know.

Also during this meeting, Shannon Percy reported on the impact of OHV use in the Black Hills and how it is affecting our snowmobile trail system. Our Black Hills system is a combination of public land (Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management), private land and public right-aways. We are seeing hesitation (if not outright

denial) to allow snowmobile access from all of these parties due to the experience these landowners are having with OHV users. Some of our trails are perilously close to being lost altogether. The damage that is caused, trespassing on riding areas that are off limits, and disrespect for landowners by these users is now affecting the snowmobile community. I know a lot of snowmobilers (and former snowmobilers) are also OHV users. I urge you to be informed on riding areas and rules so we are not part of this problem and to educate your fellow OHV riders as well. United we stand, divided we fall.

I look forward to visiting more clubs this fall and hosting a Roundtable with the President at Convention to answer questions and take input from our members.

Well, after my angiogram, the cardiologist informed Marty that I needed open heart surgery to replace my aortic valve which was now malfunctioning. No one told me....they just talked to Marty. Fast forward to mid June and I had open heart surgery.

that allows clubs to nominate any of their members that are going through a hardship due to medical issues, a house fire, or any other life altering event to receive \$1000 to help defray costs. Once someone has been nominated, it is brought in front of the Snowmobiler's 4 Snowmobiler's committee for a decision. That decision comes very quickly within a couple days, and, once approved, a check is sent to the recipient. The process is completely anonymous from beginning to end unless the recipient would like to make it public. As the name suggests, it is funded 100% from donations that come from individual snowmobilers, families and clubs. I have never seen the members of SDSA fail at coming together to support one another, so please keep Snowmobilers 4 Snowmobilers in mind if you are looking to make a donation of any size. The form to nominate someone can be found on the SDSA website. Thank you to everyone that has made a contribution to this fund; without you, this program would not be able to continue to support our fellow riders in their times of need.

Another Labor Day Weekend in the books and another snowmobile winter to continue planning for. I hope everyone enjoyed their summer. It was another great camping season, but I'd be lying if I didn't say I'm ready to move on to the Snowmobile season.

As usual to start the year off I want to discuss what took place at our most important meeting of the year with the Advisory Council in August. We had a great discussion about the budget and reroutes taking place in the Black Hills.



Fourteen grants were approved for the 2024-2025 Grant-in-Aid program, with those grants totaling just under \$380,000. Thank You to the clubs and volunteers who do a great job providing safe snow-mobiling opportunities throughout eastern South Dakota.

Also approved at the meeting was the fiscal year 2026 snowmobile budget. Not much changed from the previous year which is standard for the snowmobile program as we roll into a \$1.45 million dollar budget starting July 1st, 2025. The council was also updated about where the programs current trails fund balance is and where our fiscal year 2024 revenue and expenses ended up. Total revenue earned last year was just over \$956,000 where our final expenses came in just under \$800,000. This meant our Snowmobile Trails Fund went from \$552,246 to just over \$712,858. This fund balance is in a good place compared to what we had a year ago as you can tell. Main reason for this growth was due to the poor snow conditions which means less expenses maintaining trails and an extremely good excise tax revenue that was generated. This number came in just over \$370,000.

The month of September is always busy with the necessary paperwork to keep the snowmobile season moving forward. This includes GIA and Equipment Agreements, DOT right of way agreements, and other necessary requirements. The agreements that GFP has with the state should be in the mail by late September and if those clubs could send back a PDQ, instead of mailing it back, you can certainly do so. I'll also be contacting clubs to coordinate equipment inspections sometime in mid to late September.


Don't forget to start getting sign requests into me right away and I know clubs start meeting this month so let me know and if my schedule allows, I can plan on attending.

## Trespassing! Threatening snowmobiling access everywhere!

I believe, or at least I hope, I am preaching to the choir here. If you are a club member you should already know that you are only allowed to ride where you have permission. But we also know that is not always the case with everyone. Too often we are seeing snowmobilers riding where they are not allowed, by definition, trespassing.

Trespassing is a problem across the county. In the trails riding areas where trails are located on private property, landowners typically only allow snowmobiling to use their property on a designated corridor and any riding outside of the marked trail without permission is considered trespassing. This not only leads to a closure of a trail across one property, but it also often results in the closures of an entire section of a trail system. Many times we have found trespassing may have triggered a trail closure, but other underlying issues may have contributed, such as loud pipes or personality conflicts with club members or government officials. Regardless, this requires club volunteers to work with local landowners to create a new trail or in some cases, a permanent loss of a trail.

Even in areas when snowmobiles are allowed on public lands, it may not mean you are allowed to ride everywhere. In areas where most snowmobiling takes place on public lands, it is important to know there are areas where snowmobiles are not allowed. Riding in areas off limits to snowmobiles is considered trespassing. It is every snowmobiler's responsibility to know where they can legally ride and where it is prohibited.

While laws vary from state to state, trespassing will result in a fine if caught. Even more important, trespassing costs us access.

What has the American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ACSA) done about the problem? We have used social media to bring attention to the issue and encouraged snowmobiles to use the Snowmobile Manufacturers "Take the Pledge" campaign. ACSA has held several contests to bring attention to trespassing. We are currently holding another contest for all ages, to bring attention to the issue through the youth and hopefully their parents. Participants may have a chance to win prizes by submitting coloring pages, a word search, memes or a short video. For more information go to the ACSA website at www.snowmobilers.org.

What can you do? When someone riding in your group rides where not allowed, call them out and explain to them why it is a problem. If you catch someone trespassing report them to your local law enforcement. Let your local law enforcement know where problem areas are, so they know where to best use their resources when patrolling. Clubs can also use their social media pages to bring attention to trespassing. Make sure your trails have appropriate signage to educate everyone to stay on the trail and only ride where allowed.

We ask clubs who experience trail closures resulting from trespassing to report them to their state snowmobile association so we can show the true cost of this issue. We find many times clubs just react to the closure by finding a re-route.

We encourage everyone to be part of the solution, not part of the problem!

Hello in the Northeast Corner of the State. This summer has went by again too fast. Our club kept busy with promoting snowmobiling.





#### No Trespassing Snowmobile Awareness Contest

The American Council of Snowmobile Associations today announced the 2024-2025 No Trespassing Snowmobile Awareness Contest. This Contest will include snowmobilers of all ages, from the little ones through the experienced riders and will generate the conversation and awareness of snowmobilers across the U.S. on an issue that impacts snowmobile access. Too often volunteers are left scrambling trying to re-route snowmobilers because of trespass incursions by snowmobilers that do not understand the consequences of riding on trails/areas that are off limits to snowmobilers.

Creating the awareness of the importance of riding where marked will assist the over 2,500 snowmobile clubs across the northern tier of the U.S. "Areas that are not marked for snowmobile use are often a safety issue, with rocks or downed trees, as well as protected because of crops", says Karyn Robare, Committee Chairman with the American Council of Snowmobile Associations. "Volunteers find themselves spending valuable time with land owners or land managers that could be better spent creating new trails or maintaining the existing trail system of over 100,000 miles and thousands of acres of riding areas."

The Contest includes the following categories to promote rider responsibility, including the need to respect Land Owners and Land Managers that allow us the privilege of riding by Not Trespassing.

Snowmobilers up to the age of 6: Coloring Contest Snowmobilers between the ages of 7 -12: Word Search Snowmobilers between 13 – 17: Create a Meme Snowmobilers over age 18: Create a Video no longer than 30 seconds

#### Snowmobile Trail Volunteerism in United States

This year the International Snowmobile Council completed a survey of clubs and the amount of volunteering necessary to create and maintain snowmobile trails. Many clubs participated in this survey from the US. We are sharing that information with you.

Many snowmobilers do not realize that the trails they ride on are primarily done by club members who volunteer their time because of their love of our sport. Yes, volunteers are what keeps our snowmobile trails open! What does it take to get it to a condition we enjoy riding on? There are many parts to setting up a snowmobile trail.

- \* Working with the state Department of Parks/Natural Resources to confirm acceptance of the trail.
- \* Grants must be completed and submitted to the DNR or other state agency for approval to receive funding to pay for the cost of equipment, maintenance of their groomer and drag, and other equipment needed for trail work. Most of the planning, decisions, operating and paperwork is done by volunteers.
- \* These club volunteers must go to each landowner for permission to cross their land to obtain a legal agreement for permission to do so. Each club in the survey averaged needing signatures on 28 contracts. But it does not stop with the landowners, these club volunteers must maintain contact with them to keep the trail open and for any extraordinary circumstances that may need to be addressed, like trespassing. The average club spends 24 hours doing this.

So, how many trail miles does a club brush and clear for when snow comes? The survey suggests they manage about 348 miles with about 135 hours by volunteers preparing the trail. Oh, it also takes another 111 hours per club for properly installing/removing the trail signs!

Then, once snow comes volunteers operate the groomer with a drag to groom the trails. The average club groomer 1,172 miles of trail during the snow season traveling at about 4 miles per hour. Don't forget the volunteer labor time to operate the groomers which is an average of 366 hours per club. According to the survey, the average club has 5 volunteers operating the groomers and maintaining their equipment during the season.

During the season equipment must be maintained, again by volunteers, that amounts to 46 hours per club. Trails must be regularly checked for fallen trees and other debris that must be removed. The volunteer hours for this are 243 hours per club.

Many times, I have met snowmobilers on the trails who have no concept of what it takes to ride on a well-groomed trail. Many riders assume that state employees do the work! Many riders are not familiar with state snowmobile associations, that the clubs belongs to that are maintaining the trail with volunteers.

Hopefully this information gives you a better perspective of what it takes for trail systems and to appreciate the volunteers that work to make your snowmobiling day exciting and safe.

When you're riding, think about joining the club whose volunteers maintain it. They can use your financial help. Furthermore, you may find joining the club beneficial to find more people to ride with next time!





#### Honoring Ken Stewart for his many years of dedication to SDSA

Ken Stewart wrote this article MANY years ago and I featured it in the April 2023 issue.

It's only fitting that we feature it after the news of Ken's passing. Ken was so important to SDSA's existence. RIP Ken.

1969 was the beginning of an organization that would become one of the strongest volunteer groups in South Dakota. In the fall of 1969 the first South Dakota Snowmobile convention was held at the Sunny Side Inn in Watertown. Duane Mack presided over the meeting. It started at about 2 p.m. and was over by 4:30 p.m. There was about 12 or 15 people in attendance. The subject of the convention was entirely on the subject of racing.

From here SDSA was on its way up with a few rough spots on the way. Duane Mack was the first president of SDSA and seemed to have a second sense on when and how to take the organization on its way. Duane started a newsletter, printing it in his basement. Clubs began to spring up all over South Dakota. The organization was growing to the point that we needed a goal and some regulations to achieve this goal.

Many hours were spent driving and flying (Duane had a plane) to Pierre to talk to legislators and Game Fish & Parks people to get laws passed to the best interest of snowmobile families. We wrote the registration laws to follow the motor vehicle laws with a \$10 per year license fee. The money from this fee went into the county bridge fund. The funds from this fee, we felt, should be used for snowmobile trails so the snowmobile trails fund was established. \$8 of the \$10 was to be put in the trails fund, a dedicated fund to be only used for the promotion and establishment of snowmobile trails. We needed someone to administer this fund.

The state organization that ran somewhat close to our sport was Game Fish & Parks so they were chosen to administer this fund. There was an advisory council chosen from people interested in snowmobiling across the state to advise GFY P on the expenditure of this money.

When Gov. Janklow became Governor he felt he should appoint this group therefore giving it more credibility. The next thing was the gas tax refund. We felt the tax we paid on the gas we used in our sleds should go into the trails fund. After a long uphill battle, we got the legislators to pass a bill allowing the return of the tax money based on 100 gallons of gas for each registered sled in South Dakota. The people out west (the nine counties on the western border of SD) decided they wanted to have the funds from the gas tax

refund and from the license fee to go to the county treasure of each county to be spent in that county.

I was elected to the board of directors in 1976. I had been involved in my local club in Redfield than in SDSA but I had seen some things happening that I didn't like very well. I thought it was unproductive to have the state split into two areas. I found that the county commissioners were not realizing the funds that came in from the license and gas tax. They didn't want to spend "tax payer" money on snowmobiling. After countless trips to the Black Hills at our own expense and man hours of time we eventually got all the funds put into the trails fund and the whole state under one roof. We reorganized the Board of Directors to include the Black Hills.

In 1985 we had the opportunity to host the International snowmobile congress. This is the organization made up of delegates from 29 states and all the provinces of Canada to protect and monitor snowmobiling across the whole Snowbelt. It was very challenging and we made SDSA some money to operate our organization. I was the chairman of the congress and with the help of Don Grable, Marilyn Ruediger and many others we held a very successful congress.

I was attending a Midwest chapter meeting and one of the other state delegates mentioned that they held a legislator ride each year. I thought why not go one step further and host a Governors Ride. After a lot of planning and convincing we got the ride set up. We took Gov. Janklow and his group snowmobiling. The Governor rode like a madman and did he ever have fun. There were many pictures taken. One of him flying thru the air on his sled that ended up on the cover of the SD highway map.

The Governor and I were standing talking at the foot of the hill at four corners when I realized he had his mind on something else. All of a sudden he turned and said "look at all of these snowmobiles and this beautiful scenery, we are missing the boat, we need to promote this." Two weeks later the Black Hills was full of cameras, tourism people interviewing snowmobilers, resort owners, SDSA officers, club members and anyone else interested in snowmobiling. Shortly after, a video was produced and in the hands of every snowmobile club in North America.

I was at another Midwest chapter meeting when it was mentioned about a tax that some association was trying to get access to. I got the idea that we should try to get the 3% tax we were paying on snowmobiles when we purchased them. Again after a lot of work and trips to Pierre we got the

bill passed. The funds raised from these taxes went into the trails fund and became our largest source of income.

In the past 30 years my family came first and snowmobiling and SDSA was my second love. Snowmobiling has been good to me. My family is all interested in snowmobiling and supports me to the fullest. I have received many rewards including snowmobiler of the year in SD, national snowmobiler of the year, inducted into the international hall of fame and president of the Iron Dogs.

Over the 30 years there have been many challenges and there will continue to be. As I write this there are groups of extremists out there trying to shut down snowmobiling. Not only are they trying to shut snowmobiling tut they want to shut everyone out of federal lands. Duane Sutton and I just got back from Washington DC where we and representatives from 24 states talked to our representatives and Senators about taking our rights away on national public lands. We feel public lands belong to us not the Government. We know we have to take care of the land so that we, our kids, grandkids and great grandkids can enjoy the forest and the lands. Do your part to help keep our land open to the public.


#### **Trace Damm, District 7 Director**






